The ICNGD launched an ambitious research programme this fall.

Under the direction and coordination of Maureen Reed, Co-Director (Research) at the ICNGD and U of S Faculty (School of Environment and Sustainability and Department of Geography and Planning) and Heather Exner-Pirot, Research and Graduate Officer at the ICNGD, the Centre has

embarked on a research programme that will:

- Undertake the process of developing a set of benchmarks and indicators for Northern Saskatchewan socioeconomic analysis;
- Collaborate with partners from Scandinavia on a northern economic development vision and joint initiatives, and;
- Continue matching researchers with areas of

research priority as identified by Northern stakeholders.

Bachelor of Arts - Northern Studies

Over the summer months, the Centre assumed administrative responsibility for the BA Northern Studies program at the U of S. Kathy Walker, the Centre's new Undergraduate Program Officer, will oversee the program.

The BA Northern Studies program operates through an international global consortium that enables Northern residents or Northern

Master of Northern Governance and Development

Introduced in fall 2010 with a pilot cohort of seven students, the MNGD is the first program of its kind available in North America.

The program is administered

by the ICNGD's Research and Graduate Officer, Heather Exner-Pirot, and overseen by the Centre's Co-Director (Graduate Studies) Bonita Beatty.

The MNGD is designed with Northern professionals in mind. The courses are available via videoconference and students can complete the program while continuing to work.

International Connections



The ICNGD recently facilitated a U of S delegation to Northern Scandinavia in order to conduct meetings around research and program collaboration.

Representing the U of S were:
Lee Swanson and David Zhang of the Edwards School of Business;
Ken Coates, incoming Canada
Research Chair at the Johnson-Shoyama Graduate School of Public Policy, and; ICNGD Director Greg Poelzer.

Among the agenda items was the Northern Saskatchewan/Northern Scandinavian comparative research being conducted by the ICNGD in cooperation with the Government of Saskatchewan's Ministry of First Nations and Métis Relations, and the development of a joint Master's degree in Northern and Indigenous Affairs.

The delegation attended meetings at the University of Nordland

(Bodø, Norway), University of Tromsø (Tromsø, Norway), and Umeå (Northern Sweden).

As follow-up to the meetings with Tromsø, a delegation of faculty researchers visited the ICNGD and the U of S campus Nov. 13-15 to continue discussions. As part of the visit, the ICNGD hosted a Wine & Cheese and Lecture Series with members of the Norwegian delegation on Nov. 15. The presentations focused on Aboriginal Self-Determination & Land Rights.

Outreach Activities

The ICNGD's primary audience is located across the vast northern regions of Saskatchewan. This brings with it challenges in efforts to reach students and stakeholders who live and work in these communities.

To combat this, Cameco Corporation has financed a new Cameco Portal to the North videoconferencing unit for the ICNGD. This state-of-the-art equipment is located in Kirk Hall and enables Centre members and staff to reach their northern audiences in real time and "face-to-face". Some of the courses in the Master's program are taught via videoconference.

Another way the ICNGD is working to overcome its distance barriers is by opening a satellite office. Cathy Wheaton, a long time northern resident and an advocate for the North, has recently assumed the position of Outreach Coordinator, based out of La Ronge, SK. As part of her duties, she will be visiting Northern Saskatchewan communities to provide

Spotlight on Centre Member

Dr. Hayley Hesseln

Hayley Hesseln has been an instrumental member of the International Centre for Northern Governance and Development since the very beginning. An Associate Professor in the Department of Bioresources, Policy, Business, and Economics, Hesseln has lent her teaching and research abilities to a number of ICNGD projects. Until recently, she also served as Dean of Undergraduate Studies for the University of the Arctic at the U of S.

Some of Hesseln's research accomplishments include research on the economics of wildfire and fuels management, including an examination of the costs of fuels treatments such as prescribed burning and mechanical fuels reduction. She has explored the impacts of wildfires in the wildland urban interface, wildland fire policy, and the effects of GIS on suppression expenditures.

Hesseln's current research interests include the effects of change on the boreal forest and property rights regimes associated with natural resources across the circumpolar north. Her publications include a co-authored forest economics textbook,



Principles of Forest and Environmental Economics, and a number of journal articles related to forestry.

Debbie Billette graduated from the BA Northern Studies program, with a concentration in Public Administration, in 2008. Shortly after completing her degree, Billette went on to become the first ever female Chief at the Buffafo River Dené Nation. She continues to serve in that role today.

Billette said she was thrilled to be able to complete a degree in something that she found important and fascinating at the same time.

"Working with the public is always something that I have loved," said Billette. "I want to be interactive with the people of this community, and allow them to have a real say in what goes on. We have to always look towards the future."

Billete has identified working with local youth as one of her top priorities. Specifically, she works with other members of the community to instill core values, offer encouragement, and foster a deeper appreciation and awareness of their role in the community.
